POINTS FROM THE MISSIONARY'S PEN...

It is fitting for me to say a few words of thanks to the Vacation Bible School Team of our association. Mrs. Nancy Perry has taken the challenge of leading us for this year's VBS promotion and training in the association. She has demonstrated her absolute commitment to VBS by taking our associational team to the clinic presented by Georgia Baptist at Richmond Hill as well as securing the finest of teachers and leaders to lead our own training on April 12 at Sweat Memorial here in Waycross. If you have not RSVP'd for that meeting I encourage you to do so and plan now to have your leaders for VBS at this awesome time of fellowship with churches from all across the association.

Would you agree, "What an awesome association we are blessed to be a part of." Remember you and your church make up the POBA. Working together, we can impact the world for Jesus Christ at home and abroad. VBS is one of the key tools God uses in our association to lead many to Christ. Statistically it has been shown that VBS as a tool for reaching all ages for Christ is the single most influential ministry. Note these statistics on reasons for churches to hold VBS, as compiled by Vicki Hulsey:

- *25% of baptisms reported by the SBC come from VBS.
- *Every one person trained in VBS results in 1.1 salvation decisions.
- *10% of people enrolled in VBS are unchurched.
- *2.7 million people enroll in VBS each year.
- *72,925 people each year accept Christ as Lord and Savior.
- *2,666 people commit their lives to church-related vocations through

VBS.

*56,386 people enroll in Sunday School/Small Group Bible Study as a result of attending VBS.

Let me urge you to read the following article by Melita Thomas, specialist with Life Way in VBS. Please note closely the additional things he makes reference to related to allowing VBS to reach its greatest potential in ministering to our churches and communities.

Back in December as I was preparing for a January meeting with VBS leaders from all 50 states, Canada, and Mexico, and decided to share 11 things I have learned during my 11 years as LifeWay's VBS Ministry Specialist. The challenge was not creating a list of topics, but settling on only 11. After several days of editing the list I arrived at the following:

- 1. VBS must have a clear purpose
- 2. VBS must proclaim the gospel
- 3. VBS must be evangelistic
- 4. VBS must leave the walls
- 5. VBS must reach the family
- 6. VBS must not be complacent
- 7. VBS must provide training
- 8. VBS is transformational
- 9. You must continue learning
- 10. You are highly contagious
- 11. The pastor must lead

None of these points are new or surprising, and instead of something I learned they are actually points that have been reaffirmed over and over. They are the points I spoke about the most as I talked with VBS leaders and lead training sessions.

The following are additional things I learned during my 11 years as your VBS ministry partner:

1. Only a small percentage of the community will ever attend a tradi-

tional VBS on a church campus. We must continue looking for opportunities to take the gospel to the community and world.

- 2. There is great power in the repetitiveness of a three-hour per day, fiveday VBS. As churches decrease the number of hours and the number of days there has been a decrease in the number of professions of faith.
- 3. Morning VBS appears to be more successful than evening VBS at reaching unchurched kids and families.
- 4. The biggest challenge of VBS continues to be continuing connections/ relationships created during the week of VBS.
- 5. VBS can jump start a declining/dying congregation.
- 6. A congregation that abandons VBS sends the message that it is no longer interested in reaching kids and families
- 7. A VBS director or pastor can not do it alone. He must build a VBS team.
- 8. Every association of churches has at least one VBS groupie who would be willing to take the lead in coaching and inspiring other churches.
- 9. VBS can change the world one kid at a time.
- 10. VBS is Kingdom work.
- 11. Themes are like wrapping paper on a box. What is on the inside is much more important than the wrapping. There are many fun themes produced each year that have no evangelistic substance.
- 12. The one essential of VBS is God's Word.
- 13. Preparation is essential for a transformational event. VBS takes work.
- 14. Word of mouth is still the best way to promote VBS. Create a great experience and word of mouth will be your most successful source of advertising.

Emphasis: Revitalization of the church

The guest speaker will be Dr. Robby Foster. Dr. Foster is the Senior Pastor of Northside Baptist Church in Valdosta, Georgia. He will be sharing with us on church revitalization and connecting church revitalization to new church member orientation and the small group setting of Sunday School. This will be a training event for all of our churches. Robby has proven years of experience in church revitalization and is looking forward to coming our way to share, answer questions and help our churches move off the plateau and declining status. I cannot emphasize enough that this training event is for all size churches. Thom Rainer in his material on revitalization notes that a church that really desires to be turned around and revitalized must have a strong new member orientation process whereby those desiring to be members of the church understand the doctrinal positions of the church, what is expected of the new member as they become a part of the church, should be familiarized with how the church functions with staff and other leadership and must know that there will be certain expectations up front of those who become members of the church. These are the general areas of ministry that each member will be expected to participate in: worship, small group discipleship class, giving, service -oriented ministry, and missions. We often get little out of those who join our churches because we expect so little out of them. Expectations is one of the keys to the revitalization process and clarification of those expectations to those who desire membership in the local church.



OUR ASSOCIATIONAL AREA IS HOME TO ONE OF GEORGIA BAPTIST'S OLDEST & BEST MINISTRIES: BAPTIST VILLAGE RETIREMENT COMMUNITIES

In January 2003, I left the Atlanta area (my home for the first 43 ½ years of my life), and moved our family to Waycross, to become Pastor of FBC. For more than twelve years I drove through the gates of Baptist Village as a pastor to visit residents, and to serve as a Trustee. It quickly became obvious that the ministry of Baptist Village Retirement Communities was unique and exemplary, and it was a professionally competent ministry/business organization. I saw nurses, CNA's, and associates in all areas, providing great care and assistance. I saw Baptist Village to be the best retirement and caregiving ministry of its kind.

Now I drive through the gates of Baptist Village as an associate, as Vice President of Administration & Advancement. My role is to be an ever faithful staff member, and an ambassador for this community that makes life better for senior adults and their families. Interestingly, my position is the only thing that has changed, for the story I tell of Baptist Village is the same – this is the best retirement and caregiving ministry of its kind.

A great part of the equation that led me to this position at Baptist Village, was that my doctoral dissertation (1994 Doctor of Ministry from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary) focused on the physical, emotional, financial, and spiritual adjustment necessary for retirement and aging. Preparing for retirement, potential long term care needs, and aging sooner or later impacts all of us.

More than 60 years ago Georgia Baptist believed preparing for aging was important because they approved the start of a ministry with the primary focus to provide housing for senior citizens. After consideration of several locations, Waycross, GA was selected. In April, 1958, five residents came to live on the Waycross campus. The growth of Baptist Village from facilities accommodating five residents to facilities in three locations providing retirement living for over five hundred senior adults shows the continued commitment of Georgia Baptists to minister to the needs of God's "older children". The vision of Baptist Village Retirement Communities continues to be Serving God by Providing Excellence in Retirement Living.

been, and continues to be, in the business of *Providing* quality housing and healthcare for senior adults, demonstrating the love of God through the care of His older children and doing so in a manner that honors God. As we strive to make life better to Senior Adults and their families three ministry options are available depending on a resident's level of need: Independent Living offers homes and duplexes/villa (Waycross & Macon), Personal Care offers assistance in daily activities (all locations), and Skilled Nursing or Nursing Home Care where residents are under constant medical supervision, in need of assistance with daily living and are not capable of living independently (Waycross – J. Olan Jones Health Care Center).

In this confusing healthcare environment where the need for short-term rehabilitation is ever-increasing many senior adults and their families are seeking caregiving they can trust in an environment where they are afforded the opportunity to attain an improved condition of physical function.

The J. Olan Jones Health Care Center at Baptist Village offers rehabilita-tion services for a wide variety of health care needs—from accidents and injuries such as fractured hips and strokes—to elective surgeries like knee replacements, and other debilitating illnesses. Our entire rehabilitation team is committed to providing innovative techniques and individualized therapy to help each resident attain their highest func-tional ability. Our collaborative team is led by nurses; physical, occupational and speech therapists skilled in rehabilitation, orthopedic care and pain management.

The J. Olan Jones Health Care Center at Baptist Village also offers Occupational, Physical and Speech Therapy Services. Occupational therapists help residents improve their ability to keep up activities of daily living. Physical therapists help residents reach their highest level of independent mobility, helping to prevent injury. Speech therapists assist patients achieve improved quality of life with communication ability. Admission for these therapy services is contingent on referral by a physician and evaluation by the therapist.

VI. The Church

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.
